

WHERE DO I APPLY FOR FOOD STAMP BENEFITS?

Applying for Food Stamps is easier than ever. You can file your application in person, by mail, fax, online or your authorized representative can file it for you at any Food Stamp Center or at a participating community based organization. If you are working, are elderly or disabled, have problems with child care, or difficulty traveling to our office, you can ask to have your eligibility interview over the phone.

WHAT IF I DO NOT SPEAK ENGLISH?

We will arrange for free interpretation at the Food Stamp Center.

WHAT TYPE OF DOCUMENTATION WILL I NEED TO SHOW TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR FOOD STAMPS?

While no documentation is necessary to apply, you will eventually be asked to verify the information you give us. Below is a list of documents. If you provide them right away we can determine your eligibility faster.

- Proof of Identity:

Photo ID, driver's license, passport, naturalization certificate, hospital/doctor's records, or adoption papers.

- Proof of where you live:

Statement from landlord/primary tenant, current rent receipt or lease, or mortgage records.

- Proof of Income (if any):

Current pay stubs, pay envelopes, business records, tax records, or current income tax return, etc.

- Proof of Citizenship or Current Alien Status:

Birth certificate, U.S. passport, USCIS documentation, military service records, etc.

Other documents may also be acceptable.

IF I DON'T HAVE ALL THE DOCUMENTS NOW, CAN I STILL APPLY FOR FOOD STAMPS?

Yes, you can still apply. When possible, Food Stamp center staff will help you to get the required documents.



These Food Stamp centers are open from 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday (except legal holidays).

What You Need to Know About Food Stamps

APPLYING IS EASIER THAN EVER

The Food Stamp Program provides food support to low-income New Yorkers including working families, the elderly and the disabled to increase their ability to purchase food. You can spend your food stamps by using a debit card where you do your shopping. There's no need to carry separate food coupons.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE FOOD STAMP BENEFITS?

Many people are eligible and don't realize it. You can be employed, own your own home and car, have money saved and still be eligible for Food Stamps. Many immigrants who were once ineligible can now receive food stamps. Each application is evaluated on an individual basis and qualifying is based on income.

HOW CAN I GET A FOOD STAMP APPLICATION?

- Call HRA's Infoline at 1-877-472-8411 or 311 and we will send you an application and information on where you may bring, mail or fax it.
- Pick one up from any Food Stamp center.
- Download an application from HRA's website at NYC.gov/HRA/FoodStamps
- For an application as well as eligibility pre-screening, go to NYC.gov/ACCESSNYC

IF I AM RECEIVING SSI/DISABILITY BENEFITS, DO I STILL QUALIFY FOR FOOD STAMPS? WILL MY SSI/DISABILITY PAYMENTS BE REDUCED?

Yes, you can still qualify for Food Stamp benefits even if you receive SSI/disability benefits, as long as you meet eligibility rules. Receipt of Food Stamps does not reduce your SSI/Disability payments.

HOW SOON AFTER I APPLY WILL I RECEIVE FOOD STAMPS?

If you are eligible for Food Stamps, you will receive them within 30 days. In some cases, emergency benefits can be issued sooner.



HOW MUCH INCOME CAN I HAVE AND STILL BE ELIGIBLE FOR FOOD STAMPS?

The Food Stamp Income Guidelines and maximum monthly allotment as of October 2009 are as follows:

*Households that incur dependent care expenses are subject to higher gross income limits.

If your household has a person who is 60 or older or disabled, you only need to meet the net income limit. If everyone in your household receives SSI, TANF, or SNA you do not need to meet any income limit. Your total income, before taxes or any other subtractions, is called **gross income.

However, certain subtractions to your gross income, called deductions, are allowed. These can be for things like housing, child support payments, monthly medical expenses over \$35 for elderly or disabled people, or child-care. The amount left over after deductions is called **net income**.

The amount of Food Stamp benefits you receive depends on your household size, expenses, and your income.
